From the Minister's Desk

I'm pretty sure it was when Beth Sterba was sharing some of her thoughts about the Advent Candle theme of Joy when I realized something. As someone who struggles with the concept of joy in real-life terms, taking emotions out of its definition for most part, I realized that I experience joy when I am leading worship, and particularly when preaching.

That brings me back to a theme that is very topical in November, but is always in season, and that is gratitude. I don't get to preach in the pulpit at St. Peter's United Church of Christ in a major suburb of a major American city by my own will, talents, treasure or charm. Ordination gives me a 'license' to preach, but not to be heard. That needs to be earned, and in addition to earning the authorization to preach and celebrate the sacraments through ordination, one earns it by the permission, trust, and call, of a local congregation. In other words, I am grateful for St. Peter's for calling me to be its Pastor and Teacher, and I'm grateful not just because preaching gives me joy. There is a lot to be grateful for in the pastoral ministry, and for serving in this congregation.

I recently said in a sermon that when I start to get depressed, caught up in my own mental drama, or otherwise not in a good place inside (and sometimes 'outside!'), I've learned to start thinking of things I'm grateful for. I start out with simple things that others have taught me not to take for granted: I'm alive. I'm breathing easily. I have a loving wife, I know Jesus who also knows me, I have a job, a roof over our heads, food in the refrigerator, clothing, a good education, my late parents, and more. I'm grateful for the beautiful blue sky when it graces us overhead, and for coffee, health insurance and healthy cats, the people in this congregation, colleagues, old friends, good neighbors, and of course, first and foremost, salvation. In the sermon, I said that working towards gratitude, although not always willingly at the start, always works to lift my spirits and my posture towards the day.

I bring up gratitude because entering a new year means entering into the future, with times of transition, of uncertainty, maybe serious health issues, relationship issues, financial strains, etcetera. I bring up gratitude because keeping an attitude of gratitude close always can help us, and our church, navigate the waters of 2023 in a healthier manner than we might if we were not thankful for all that we've got. To God be the glory!

NEW FLAGPOLE - If you've driven past us on Oakton, perhaps you noticed our new addition - our flagpole and proud American flag, flying since Veterans Day. The pole and its installation were donated by Bill Todd, our nephew, through his company "All American Flag Company" to honor his late parents, Bill and Sally Todd, former members of St. Peter's. Bill also gave us a new American flag, but we are flying a personal American flag - this time, on my side of the family. This flag draped the casket of my stepbrother, William Olson, who was killed in action in World War II at the age of 21. His father, my stepfather, was a veteran of World War I, and my husband Jim and his brother Bill were both Korean veterans. Jim was in Korea for almost 2 years. The backdrop for this memorable flag is our Educational Building, built in 1956 as the behest and inspiration of Rev Kenneth Taylor, who also served in WWII in China. And there are, no doubt, many in our congregation, past and present, who service our country in many wars - this flag, flying today, honors them all. God bless them, and God bless America. - spoken aloud in a Sunday service by Barbara Todd.
